Gateshead Community Safety Board

- Gateshead Community Safety Board (CSB) agreed in January the Gateshead Serious Violence Action Plan, in accordance with the new statutory duty
- The CSB and Northumbria Strategic Adult Safeguarding Board have agreed streamlining of the processes for Anti-Social Behaviour case reviews, reducing the number of appeal stages from two to one and putting Community Safety Partnerships (CSP) in charge of those appeals.
- Work is underway to draw up a new CSP plan, covering April 2024 to March 2026, with the
 provisional priorities emerging from the Strategic Assessment being violence, domestic abuse,
 alcohol and drug-related offending and preventing violent extremism, and subject to public
 consultation during February and March, The Community Safety Board on 22 March agreed to add a
 fifth priority, Antisocial Behaviour, in response to the consultation process.
- The strategic review of domestic abuse was reported to the Domestic Abuse Partnership Board on Friday 9 February and a task and finish group was appointed to do further work to support decisionmaking at the next Domestic Abuse Partnership Board meeting on Wednesday 8 May.
- Domestic homicide reviews are continuing to occur at unprecedented levels, challenging capacity.
- An additional Community Safety Coordinator has now joined the team, and interviews took place for an apprentice in late March.

Northumbria Police

The new Northumbria Police structure, reverting to six Area Commands aligned with local authorities' boundaries, took effect on Monday 4 March. Gateshead will once again have a dedicated management team, rather than sharing with Newcastle, consisting of Chief Superintendent (Area Commander) Paul Stewart, Superintendent (Deputy) Lisa Laverick and three chief inspectors (Neighbourhoods – Tom Hart, Response/Shifts, - Christopher Farish and Crime – Gillian Beecroft).

Safeguarding Adult Reviews

A Safeguarding Adult Review (SAR) was commissioned in 2023 following the death of a Gateshead resident who was found dead in their home. Further information, a copy of the final report and a short PowerPoint presentation are available on the <u>Safeguarding website</u>.

• Strategic Plan 2024-27

The Gateshead Safeguarding Adults Board's revised <u>Strategic Plan for 2024-2027</u> was published on Monday 1 April.

The plan identifies five priority areas which the board will be working on over the next five years.

• 'Pressure ulcers: how to safeguard adults' – Department of Health and Social Care guidance <u>The revised Pressure ulcers: how to safeguard adults</u> guidance was published in January 2024. The board will be using the guidance to update its own practice guidance.

Safeguarding Children Partnership

'Working Together to Safeguard Children 2023'

This updated guidance, published in December 2023, introduces a set of multi-agency expectations for all practitioners involved in safeguarding and child protection, specifically: police, local authorities, health services, probation services, youth offending services, education providers and childcare settings, and voluntary organisations.

This revision to the guidance focuses on strengthening multi agency working across the whole system of help, support and protection for children and their families, keeping a child-centred approach while bringing a whole family focus, and embedding strong, effective and consistent multi-agency child protection practice.

The update includes:

- Principles for working with parents and carers that centre the importance of building positive, trusting and co-operative relationships to deliver tailored support to families
- Expectations for multi-agency working that apply to all individuals, agencies and organisations working with children and their families, across a range of roles and activities
- New national multi-agency child protection standards that set out actions, considerations and behaviours for improved child protection practice and better outcomes for children
